The “Mirror of the Martyrs” traveling exhibit continues in the Albrecht Gallery of Sauder Visual Arts Center at Bluffton University. Gallery hours are Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. – 5 p.m.; Saturday, 1-5 p.m. and Sunday, 1-6 p.m.

- Dr. Gerald J. Mast, Bluffton University professor of communication, will present “What Suffering Martyrs Teach Us about Christian Mission: Lessons from the Passau Songs of the ‘Ausbund,’” at 4 p.m. today in the Kreider Room, Marbeck Center. Among the Anabaptist martyrs memorialized in “Martyrs Mirror” were the composers and singers of the core songs of the early Swiss Anabaptist hymnbook—the “Ausbund.” This presentation explains how these witnesses, imprisoned in the Passau castle during the mid-1530s, conceived of Christian mission as joyful sharing together in the suffering and salvation of Jesus Christ.
- Sunday, Oct. 15, 4 p.m., Yoder Recital Hall, “Grace to You and Peace: Voices of the Martyrs,” Wendy Chappell-Dick and the Anabaptist Singers. This performance presents Anabaptist martyr ballads, translated into English from the original sources, and set to contemporary tunes -- from camp songs to folk music to rock and roll. Because many of these song texts tell the stories of martyrs and have thus not been regarded as fitting for congregational singing, this is the first time many of these songs have been sung in English
