**Today the pastors involved in Bluffton Area Ministerial Association** are participating in a pulpit exchange. This is one of the ways we envision collaborating together as we work in the Bluffton Community toward unity and transformation. Pastor George is preaching at Emmanuel UCC and we welcome Sister Carol Inkrott from St. Mary's Catholic Church. Sister Carol is originally a farm girl from Putnam County and has been a Sister of St. Francis for 55 years. She has been a grade school teacher, high school teacher, a member of St. Mary's leadership team, a pastoral associate, a director of religious education and now a pastoral leader. She likes to sew, hike, put together jigsaw puzzles, and look at model homes.

Did you know...

...that many decisions in the congregation take time?

...that some decisions happen quickly? The custom of sharing one communion cup came from the old country. Some of the men chewed tobacco. When Dr. and Mrs. Mosiman joined the congregation in 1920, the common cup was still being used. Mrs. Mosiman did not appreciate this, especially if she followed a tobacco chewer. She spoke out against such an unsanitary practice. Soon First Mennonite started to use individual communion cups.

...that when Lena Moser's family came to Bluffton in 1925 the men sat on one side and the women on the other? Her parents wanted to sit together so they did. Soon other families began sitting together.

**FIRST Night will be held** Tuesday, Jan. 31. Those attending should bring their own table service. The menu for January 31 will include ham loaf/edamame salad, buttered corn, cabbage salad, dinner rolls with butter and jelly, and fruit. **A registration table will be set up in the fellowship hall after worship today and January 29. Registrations must be paid by noon on the Monday prior to the event.**

**MCC has issued an urgent call for hygiene kits and relief kits.** We are starting to collect hygiene kits. (Information on relief kits will be forthcoming. Hygiene kit contents (NEW items, in original packaging) must include one adult-size toothbrush, one large bar bath soap, one fingernail clipper (good quality) and one hand towel (dark color.) Please limit your generosity to the items listed. (Due to strict regulations in some countries, MCC no longer asks for toothpaste. They add it to the kits when they are shipped from our warehouse. We also need bag fabric and people to sew bags. Sewing directions are on the kit card in the kit collection area of the fellowship hall. Some precut bags and cords are also there. (If making your own bags, please note that the bag size has changed over the years and fabric is cut 12½ x 38 inches.)

**Weekday Christian Education** is looking for First Mennonite attenders to help with walking elementary school students from the elementary school to WCE, which takes place at FMC. WCE is a program with a desire to aid the church and home in encouraging the spiritual growth and development of kindergarten to eighth grade
