

MCC kits -- Thank you to all who contributed to our relief kit and hygiene kit drive. Our numbers for kits, money, and supplies collected equal: hygiene kits - 100; relief kits - 21; school kits - 11. (Our hygiene kit numbers were down, but relief kits total considerably more than four hygiene kits each, so we did better than the numbers

suggest.) We will start collecting school kits when sales begin in July. The contents for those kits have changed, so look for updated lists in a month or so.

- June 24-August 26: Our worship services will be held at 10:30 a.m. in the Bluffton Middle School cafetorium. Please enter by the double doors across the street from the FMC Jackson Street entrance. Sunday school classes and coffee time will meet in the basement of First Mennonite Church.
- June 18-July 24: Removal of pews, removal of organ and some pipes, plaster repair (if needed), painting, new light bulbs
- July 25-August 5: Construction of steps and railings August 6-19: Hardwood flooring put in (front of sanctuary floor and stage area), sanding and clear coating of wood floor under and in balcony
- August 20-25 or 31: Carpet installed, along with new rubber stairs by Church Street door
