First Mennonite Church is affiliated with the Central District Conference of Mennonite Church USA. The Mennonites are named after Menno Simons, one of our early church leaders, and are rooted historically in the “Anabaptist” movement, which began in 1525, with origins in Switzerland, Germany, and the Netherlands now reaching around the world. Some primary Anabaptist convictions then and now are following Jesus Christ in service to others, rejection of violence and war, and joyful community life.



- “The Crucible” by Arthur Miller will be presented Nov. 2, 3 and 4, at 7:30 p.m., and Nov. 5, at 2:30 p.m. in Ramseyer Auditorium, College Hall. The drama depicts events related to the 1692 witch trials in the Puritan village of Salem, MA. Melissa Friesen is the director.
- “Music of the Martyrs: A Choral Tapestry” will be performed at 6:30 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 5, in Yoder Recital Hall. Directed by Dr. Mark Suderman, the event will feature organist Dr. Shirley Sprunger King performing “Singing at the Fire,” a three movement composition by Brent Weaver featuring stories from the “Martyrs Mirror.” The concert includes choral arrangements of hymns that reflect the Christian commitment to faithful and costly witness, including Anabaptist martyr songs.

The colorful image on the bulletin cover of the woman clothed with the sun confronting the seven-headed dragon is Lucas Cranach's illustration of Revelation 12 in the 1534 edition of Martin Luther's translation of the German Bible.

Today, we welcome Isaac Villegas, pastor of Chapel Hill (N.C.) Mennonite Fellowship. He is a member of the governing board of the North Carolina Council of Churches and has served on the denominational board of Mennonite Church USA, as well as non-profit organizations. He is a graduate of Westmont College and has a M.Div. from Duke Divinity School.

Our sermon response hymn today is a translation of stanzas 1, 14, and 18 from an *Ausbund* hymn by Michael Schneider: "O Herre Gott in deinem Thron." Michael Schneider was one of the leaders of a group of nearly sixty men and women imprisoned as Anabaptists in the Passau Castle from 1537-40. This Anabaptist community was a group of singers and songwriters associated with the mystical Anabaptism of Hans Hut and Philip Plener. While in the Passau prison, they composed a collection of 51 remarkable spiritual songs that form the core of the larger Swiss Anabaptist hymnal – the *Ausbund*. Michael Schneider wrote eleven of these songs – including our sermon response hymn. The Passau songs acknowledge the conflict that is part of genuine Christian faith and invite all believers to share together joyfully in the suffering of Christ as God's love made visible in the world. This song is one of three *Ausbund* songs for which Martin Luther's tune "Ein feste Burg" is recommended.
