Congregational Discernment Team hosts and invites conversations

As we discern together during January and February, the Congregational Discernment Team has identified a process based on a methodology rooted in the belief that the community of faith is an interpretive community when it comes to interpretation of scripture, and also as we seek to understand who we are and how God's Spirit is moving/calling us into the future. Therefore, we are intentionally hosting and inviting conversations, around tables, through testimonies in worship, and in the many informal conversations that take place among us.

Another implication of this belief in the community of faith as interpretive body is that we want to continue both listening and responding, creating a conversation loop through which we continue to find our way. This isn't a linear process and sometimes makes us feel uncertain, but it can also help us focus on and be especially attentive to the Spirit who guides us.

This doesn't mean we are meandering without any outcome in mind! The intense schedule of three congregational discernment gatherings within two months was designed to lay the groundwork for a search committee that we hope will begin their work sometime in March. In addition to the

discernment process, there are several other things being done in parallel. Our Conference Minister has been alerted that we hope to begin a search in March. Council is working at identifying a group of individuals to serve that is representative of the congregation. Staff Relations Committee is updating our Congregational Information Form. All this is in motion, in an attempt to initiate our search in a timely way, at a time of year when many pastors who are open to a new call are also searching. It is also important timing, because we've engaged Pastor George as a Pastoral Associate for 18 months, which will end in December of 2017.

When you read the summary (bright orange page) of the first discernment event you saw that the list of core values that will carry us forward is a raw list. Deacons since spent some time synthesizing that list, and came up with four main values:

1. Following Jesus: This is first, and the value out of which all the others flow. At the core as FMC, we value *following Jesus*. We might call it discipleship. It is a particular way of following Jesus in an Anabaptist understanding, with a deep commitment to mission, service, and peace and justice.
2. Nurturing faith: We at FMC are committed to *nurturing faith within the fabric of our relationships*. In particular, we long for community and nurturing relationships over the entire life span and range of life experiences, and in ways that are intergenerational.
3. Connections: As mentioned above, we are committed to lives of mission, peace and justice, and service, reflecting Christ's broad invitation to all people, our neighbors across the street and around the world. (Note that about half items on the list have an outward focus.)
4. Worship: Finally, FMC places a high value on corporate worship and we recognize that for us, worship and music are of the same cloth. Our worship each week purposefully grows out of scripture and engages us with scripture.

Although they were not developed with a direct link to our vision statement, "Vision: Healing and Hope" these four values align with and support this vision. "God calls us to be followers of Jesus Christ and by the power of the Holy Spirit to grow as communities of grace, joy and peace, so that God's healing and hope flow through us to the world." May God's Spirit continue to lead us, breathing new life into our community of faith as we seek to be faithful in this time and into the future.
