express our creativity - for ourselves and also to pass on to future generations?" We were encouraged to make some time for personal reflection.

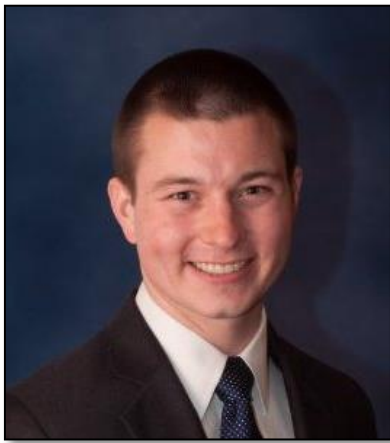
