

Delegates wanted! The **Central District Conference Annual Meeting** is slated for June 22-24 at Goshen College, College Mennonite Church. We can send 10 delegates to the Annual Meeting. If you have interest in being a delegate or want to learn more about it, contact Pastor Phil or Pastor Carrie.

On **April 16**, we will host Bill & Carole Schumacher during an **elective SS class** in the Fellowship Hall to share information about water safety in Bangladesh. Naturally occurring arsenic contamination in the drinking water kills at least 43,000 people per year and disables many more. The World Health Organization has described it as the largest mass poisoning in human history. The Schumachers and some former MCC workers are working closely with SIM, a well-known and well-respected mission organization, to establish an arsenic project in a new area of Bangladesh.

The Honduran Mennonite Church owns a small retreat center near Lake Yojoja named Finca Diakonia (Discipleship Farm), and is appealing for help in repairing, painting, and re-roofing the existing buildings. They are suggesting that small groups would arrive on Saturdays, go to church at our Sister Church in Colonia Lopez on Sunday, work Monday through Friday, and leave for home on the following Saturday. As well as daily work at the retreat center, workers will be treated to the famous Baked Tilapia fish dinners at Lake Yojoja, and tours of local Honduran sites. The cost for lodging, meals, and local transportation is \$500, plus airfare.
