SORTING OUT PRIORITIES

One of my favorite lines from the Harry Potter series comes from the first book in the series "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone." In the book, the three main characters, Harry, Ron and Hermione are sneaking around their school of magic that has dangers lurking everywhere. During this late night expedition, they nearly get killed.

Hermione says to the boys

"Now, if you two don't mind, I'm going to bed before either of you come up with another clever idea to get us killed. Or worse, expelled."

Once she leaves, Ron says to Harry,

"She needs to sort out her priorities."

For Hermione academics were the highest priority throughout the series - apparently even more important than her life!

We all have priorities - which are often expressed in what we do with our time. Sometimes I have ideals that I think are my priorities, but I don't live them out. Like when I am scrolling on my phone for an hour. I know I have priorities that I want to live out. I have things in my life that are more important to me than the next meme. Then why do I scroll anyway?

I guess to a certain extent, phone scrolling is one of my priorities. In religion, we have a lot of ideals. We talk a lot about love, and grace, and following Jesus. Oftentimes, we have these ideals, but struggle to put them into action! Gandhi also famously said. "I like your Christ, I do not like your Christians. Your Christians are so unlike your Christ."

How do we shift from having priorities that are ideals, to living them out as a community. How do we continue to work towards being LIKE Christ?

Before I came to FMC, I was really encouraged by a succinct document that was shown to me during the interview process. It was FMC's "Five Priorities."

- Follow Jesus in the Anabaptist tradition.
- Nurture faith within relationships.
- Extend hospitality.

- Engage scripture in participatory worship.
- Identify, develop, and express gifts.

I thought this was a great list of priorities - a great list of ideals that I hope to prioritize myself. I hope we can continue to live out these priorities and not simply claim them and not act on them. Like me scrolling on my phone!

It would be an interesting practice to compare this list to a list of actions that FMC has taken in the last year, and see if they line up with our priorities. I am guessing that we have acted in ways that identify with each of these priorities, but like in all things, there probably is some space for growth too!

So I thought it might be good to explore these 5 priorities over five Sundays in September and October, where we can consider how we are prioritizing them, and dream about how we continue to live into this vision as a church.

REALLY? THE BLOCK PARTY IS A PRIORITY?

You might have heard, literally, that last weekend's Vine Street Block Party was rockin'! Greenhorn's annual event featured DJs and dancing, booths, mini golf, and lots of great Greenhorn fare including Mexican street corn, donut burgers, and Trusty's favorite, grilled watermelon! FMC joined the festivities by hosting a booth with activities for all

ages: an interactive Bingo game with prizes, sidewalk chalk drawing (thanks, Isaac Schumacher!), and the Soapbox, where people could stand up and talk about anything they wanted for 1 minute with a guaranteed listening audience. Soapbox highlights included Bruce Steingass' jokes, a birthday serenade for Gail Clingerman, and Kathy Dickson gettin' her groove on! The newly finished Pride quilt also made its debut alongside our Vision statement.

Our presence at the event signaled our support of Greenhorn and the Bluffton community, which helped us realize one of our 5 Priorities that day: Extend Hospitality. The expanded version of this priority, called "Connecting," articulates a commitment to "lives of mission, peace and justice, and service, reflecting Christ's broad invitation to all people, our neighbors across the street (and on Vine Street!) and around the world."

The idea to participate in the Block Party was initiated when Greenhorn owners Jonah and Nancy Corle-Agner approached Pastor Phil with the idea of an official sponsorship only a few weeks prior to this year's event. After several conversations among staff and Leadership Circle, it was decided it was too late to sponsor the event (by giving \$1000) without more congregational input. For this year, at least 14 FMC member households contributed financial support to help offset the costs associated with the event. During the upcoming year, our

congregation will spend some time processing the idea of serving as an official sponsor of Greenhorn's annual Block Party scheduled each August.

Since the Greenhorn opened, overlaps in mission between the restaurant and FMC have become apparent. Sustainable food and building community are two areas of alignment. Pastor Phil noted, "There are many things that I am excited about in developing this connection with Greenhorn. Last winter, we worked with them and Kathy Dickson through her work at MTSO to bring Dr. Chris Carter to the restaurant to discuss the intersection of race, food, and faith, and I feel that this connection could continue to deepen."

As we settle back into our routines this fall, Pastor Phil will help us revisit our commitment to extending hospitality and all 5 Priorities, which were developed in 2016-17 through congregational input and the guidance of the ad hoc Congregational Discernment Team, through a 5 week sermon series. Phil's exploration of these themes will help him understand the collective identity of this church as he also provides us with some fresh insights into whom we aspire to be. May the creative Spirit work among us to revive our commitments and walk innovative paths as a church family! (See more photos on p.7.)

o Parents with new children in a choir are welcome to stay as needed.


