



From Ten Thousand Villages: All over the world we see injustice, war, and exploitation. The coffee industry is one of the worst for environmental degradation and worker exploitation. According to the Bergon Project, 7% to 10%, but sometimes as low as 1% to 3% - of the retail price reaches the hands of coffee farmers. Our Fair Trade mission is to build long-term trade partnerships with farmers in the developing world that are economically just and environmentally sound. Our mission is urgent enough that for the next year, we are offering an extravagant deal for our supporting churches: Fair Trade Coffee at a 44% discount, after farmers have been paid in full. All our coffee is organic and comes in cases of 6. The cost for a case of regular is \$50 and decaf is \$55. Orders from the church are due Mar. 18, and coffee can be picked up from **Ten Thousand Villages** and paid for at the store after Monday, Mar. 25.

The Goshen College Voices of the Earth choir will spend their spring break touring and performing in churches and schools across Ohio and Chicago from Feb. 25 to Mar. 3. The tour will focus on the theme "New Dreams," and will be directed by H. Roz Woll, assistant professor of music. Ana Neufeld Weaver is traveling with this group. 
than 20 performers interested. If you would like to attend, the recital will take place in the sanctuary. Refreshments will be served afterward.
