



The comforter making mission is back up and running at First Mennonite Church. We're hoping to involve many people of **all ages and genders** in the program. The first step is to have comforter tops made in preparation for knotting. If anyone has fabric they would like to donate to this cause, that would be great. Large pieces of multiple yards would especially be appreciated, although anything larger than a third of a yard is welcome. Fabric should be sturdy and washable, either cotton or flannel. Bright and medium-todark colors preferred. You can put the fabric in the Fellowship Hall on the cart beside the library door in the tub labeled donated "donated fabrics." There are kits with fabric cut and ready to sew in another tub on the cart.

Joy Fellowship Mennonite Church, one of our sibling congregations in Central District Conference (CDC), suffered major water damage to their foundation following a storm in early May. The costs for repair are \$78,000. The CDC Board of Directors is providing \$7,800 of unrestricted reserves to assist with the costs. We encourage congregations to consider a gift as well. Joy serves one of the most academically and socially challenged areas of Peoria, Illinois. The building in which they meet is a mixed occupancy structure. The lower portion of the building has a sanctuary and classrooms. The upper portion is used for fellowship, classrooms, and houses a kitchen. Joy is working on a Kids Cool program that emphasizes spiritual connection and has a focus on arts, education, and athletics. There are 20 regular attendees for worship. This spring, multiple tornadoes, straight-line winds, and floods occurred in western Ohio, prompting many to ask this question:

HOW DO WE RESPOND TO DISASTERS THAT HAPPEN IN OUR NEIGHBORHOODS AND TO OUR NEIGHBORS?

When a disaster occurs, MDS initially relies on volunteers in our Anabaptist churches to begin assessing damage and to plan with others in the MDS network about if, when, and how to respond in helpful and meaningful ways. This requires organization before a local disaster occurs.




#### Welcome to our worship service today.
