

"The global refugee situation remains an urgent problem that has reached dramatic proportions. It was remarkable finding this statement among the papers and files in basement storage at FMC because it could well have been written yesterday. Additionally, it was among the pages of documents in folders labeled

The Clock

In the early 90s, the Shekochikhin family connected with FMC through a refugee program when fleeing Russia in pursuit of religious freedom. As a gesture of thanks, the family presented FMC with the clock that could be found hanging above the drinking fountain. Numerous trips to clock repair shops and the delicate touch needed to maintain accurate time relegated the clock to temporary storage. Future plans for the clock include a new home on the 3rd floor landing among the pastors' portrait gallery as part of a proposed historical archive with a more detailed history of the efforts in sponsoring the Shekochikhin family and a number of other refugees over the years. This clock serves as a tangible symbol of the immigrant and refugee work of this FMC congregation and perhaps will stir us to dream of more ways to support the immigrant in these days.
