



FMC was governed by 7 nine-member commissions and a church council across several decades, and it served FMC well. With this governance, there were many ways for folks to be involved in the decision-making and leadership of the church. The commissions created a sense of community and connection, and a structure created opportunities.

In the last 2 decades, capital "C" Church has changed. With more activities and ways to be involved in the broader community, and the demands of capitalism and work, Sunday morning attendance for many has decreased. Having several weekly evening meetings became harder to commit to, and it grew more difficult to fill vacancies

on commissions.

By August 2014, FMC was undergoing a pastoral transition when Pastor Louise Wideman resigned, and took the opportunity to form a Nision Task Force. This group met for several years guiding congregational gatherings and input sessions. This group concluded their work and the

Congregational Discernment Team formed in the fall of 2016. They described their process with this byline:

Remember Our Past, Explore Our Possibilities, Live Our Journey." In November 2017, at the recommendation of the Congregational Discernment Team, the Governance Task Force was created to lead us in a process of examination of our current structure for accomplishing our vision, purpose and priorities. This recommendation came with the observation that our structure no longer served us as a congregation.

The new governance structure proposed under the leadership of the Governance Task Force would have the flexibility to start and end ministries as interest and passion would rise and decline. Church participants would be empowered by the "circle leaders," "pastors," "gifts discernment and ministry participation," to listen to the spirit and develop emerging ministries (like the FUN Committee, Racial Justice Committee, or the LGBTQ Allies Ministry). It had new rules like, "if there is not a need to meet, then do not have a meeting!"

While there are new gifts that come with a new governance structure, there are new pitfalls and losses. We are still getting into a rhythm, and some of us miss the familiar ways of working together. So today, we recognize the gifts of the previous structure, we celebrate it, and let it go.

In response to God's unconditional love for all people, we welcome you to join us on our journey of faith in Jesus Christ. We are committed to breaking down dividing walls and building community where all are loved and accepted. We believe in active inclusion and invite each one to participate in the life and ministry of our congregation.
